Every year for the past 32 years, those who make and follow international news and the many conflicts that shake our planet have gathered in Bayeux.

For one week, the first town to be liberated in France welcomes the world of international journalism committed to war zones, in an approach that is as clear-sighted as it is essential: to bear witness in order to understand, denounce and even repair.

The biggest names from the biggest newsrooms, the best photographers, but also novice reporters, all direct witnesses to the most important and most anonymous conflicts, press pause in the capital of the Bessin region. 350 professionals gather to shed light on the darkest corners of the planet. They will also ask questions, explain their mission to the general public, reward the best reports and pay tribute to their colleagues who have been imprisoned, disappeared or killed. This year, the jury will be chaired by the renowned reporter Jon Lee Anderson. His American perspective is eagerly awaited in light of recent international events.

On the agenda for this unique event: two film evenings, one on information in the age of algorithms, two evening debates, an awards ceremony, eight new exhibitions, including one outdoors, screenings of documentaries and films, a book fair, live radio broadcasts, round tables, exclusive meetings with reporters and the traditional unveiling of a plaque at the Memorial to Reporters...

The Bayeux Award is more than a tribute: it is a civic engagement with the truth of the world, which reporters in the field, often at the risk of their lives, strive to document. In an era where narratives clash and misinformation circulates faster than nuance, this award is a strong act of support for rigorous and courageous journalism and an invaluable tool for raising awareness and educating those who are discovering the world and trying, alongside us, to understand it better. For this 2025 edition, marked by numerous conflicts and persistent geopolitical tensions, we strongly reaffirm our shared commitment – the Normandy Region, the Department of Calvados and the City of Bayeux – to bringing this unique moment of reflection, education and dialogue to life.

Thank you and well done to the journalists, photographers, filmmakers, teachers, organising team, volunteers, partners and audiences, young and old alike, who are working to make this event a success and to uphold the values of humanism, freedom and peace in Normandy.

Sudan, war on the ashes of revolution

Curator: Fliott Brachet

Four years after the peaceful revolution that led to the fall of dictator Omar Al-Bashir in 2019 and opened a window of hope for the country, Sudan has imploded. Since 15 April 2023, the country has been torn apart and plunged into all-out war. Fighting between the regular army and the Rapid Support Forces militia has already left more than 150,000 people dead, displaced a third of Sudan's 44 million people and plunged the country into the world's worst humanitarian crisis, with nearly half the population on the brink of famine.

Starting in Khartoum, the conflict is spreading to all regions and communities of the country, fuelled by ethnic hate speech, the influx of foreign mercenaries and sophisticated weapons, against a backdrop of geopolitical competition and regional interference. In the pluralistic, democratic 'New Sudan' advocated by millions of protesters, the two coup generals - who seized power in 2021, putting an end to the democratic transition - have opted for war, driving the final nail into the coffin of the revolution. As the conflict drags on, society is becoming polarised. Revolutionary and peaceful voices are being silenced by bullets and often forced into exile.

Through the eyes of Sudanese and international artists and photographers, this exhibition looks back at the sudden explosion in Sudan and the shift from euphoria to devastation.

Our Paths to Damascus

Curators: Abdulmonam Fassa et Ghaith Abdul Abad

All it takes is a few words expressing your opinion next to your painting or photograph, and you'll find yourself hunted, exiled, or threatened with assassination - and, at best, barred from working. For more than five decades, any ideas that ran counter to the ideology of the al-Assad regime were forbidden; this was a system founded on tyranny, dictatorship, violence, torture, and corruption.

From the very first moments of the Syrian revolution in 2011, Syrians chose to voice their dreams and demands in countless ways, including photography and the visual arts. Over the years of war, this gave rise to a singular environment for documentation, reportage, and expression, but it cost dozens of photographers and activists their lives and forced hundreds into exile

On December 8, 2024, the Assad regime fell, and Syria's doors swung open once more, to foreign journalists and photographers, and to Syrians who'd been living abroad for decades.

> This exhibition brings together the work of Svrian photographers and visual artists who are now able to create again in their homeland. They bring stories, images and visions that have been silenced for fifty-four years of tyranny.

Syria Year 0

After more than ten years of war, Syria enters 2025 in a period of uncertain transition. Bashar al-Assad's regime has collapsed, leaving behind a country in ruins: more than 580,000 dead, 100,000 missing and 13 million displaced or refugees. The regime waged a total war against its own people, relying on a sprawling security apparatus: mass arrests, systematic torture, enforced disappearances, and aerial bombardments of civilian areas. Entire neighbourhoods in cities such as Aleppo, Homs, Deraa and Yarmouk were razed to the ground by artillery and air strikes. Detention centres (Saïdnaya, Tadmor, Mezzeh) and the various branches of the intelligence services have been the instruments of a regime based on fear, silence and erasure. At the same time, Islamic State has imposed another form of terror on certain regions, based on spectacular violence, public executions and the destruction of heritage. In Palmyra, ancient temples and the columns of the Roman

theatre were blown up in an attempt to erase all traces of memory that did not conform to their ideology. These two systems, in different forms, imposed silence through repression, fear, disappearance or destruction. This black-

stand: abandoned prisons, empty cells, ruined neighbourhoods, deserted streets. Through these remnants, the image of a collapsed world emerges, where we move seamlessly from the ruins of antiquity to those of the present. What emerges is not only the history of a war, but that of the brutal disappearance of a civilisation caught between two forms of totalitarianism.

Goma, the turning point

At the end of January 2025, following a lightning offensive, Goma, the capital of North Kivu in the east of the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC), fell to the armed group M23. Created in 2012 by rebel officers belonging to the Armed Forces of the Democratic Republic of Congo (FARDC), the M23 is supported by Rwanda, according to the United Nations. This is one of the last convulsions of a conflict that began 30 years earlier with the Rwandan genocide of 1994.

The capture of the city was preceded by five days of violent clashes between M23 and FARDC. The number of civilian casualties - men, women and children - remains controversial. Hospitals and morgues were quickly overwhelmed. More than 650,000 displaced persons were

> living in camps around Goma, having fled fighting in the region in recent years. They were trapped in the fighting and tried repeatedly to flee, terrified and with nowhere to ao.

> Goma is now a city governed by the Congo River Alliance/M23, which has set up a parallel administration. However, the banking system is down, food prices have skyrocketed and the airport has stopped operating. In the months following this upheaval, most neighbourhoods are affected by insecurity. Sexual violence remains widespread.

The exhibition offers a variety of perspectives from

Congolese and international photographers who documented the few days during which the fate of Goma, a city of over a million inhabitants, was turned upside down, as well as the daily lives of the Congolese men and women who still live there, isolated from the rest of the DRC.

War Is Personal is a multimedia experience of the Russian-Ukrainian war, created and lived through by Ukrainian photojournalist and documentary filmmaker Julia Kochetova. Documentary photography is mixed with poetry, electronic music, sketches, and real war objects - to make you see, hear, touch, and feel war..

"As a Ukrainian, I never chose war. I became part of a generation of war and revolution."

I've been witnessing the Russian-Ukrainian war for more than 10 years now - with pauses - and I'm terribly afraid of silence. In war, silence is the harbinger of bad news.

Silence about my war means no news about Ilkraine - it's when human lives are turned into maps, infographics, numbers - and it becomes all too easy to lose the human being in that.

Wars painfully look the same. The wider image often erases the individual

A drone shot can be powerful in showing the scale of destruction - but what about the human? People don't remember numbers. People remember people. People don't remember the trench - they remember the people in the trench. I wanted to give this war a name and a face. Because it's mine. too."

Gaza Project

Since 7 October 2023, more than 200 journalists and media workers have been killed in Gaza, making this conflict the deadliest for the press in decades.

Forbidden Stories, an international network of investigative journalists based in Paris, has teamed up with more than 50 reporters from 13 newsrooms around the world to conduct a collaborative investigation into the targeting of reporters in Gaza, the arrests and threats faced by journalists in the West Bank, and the destruction of media infrastructure, such as the AFP offices destroyed in the Hajji tower.

Combining eyewitness accounts, fieldwork, open-source intelligence (OSINT) techniques and photogrammetry, the Gaza Project has uncovered a damning series of evidence that challenges the Israeli government's denials and questions respect for international humanitarian law in a conflict where information itself has become a target. This exhibition takes you behind the scenes of this investigation.

Yemen Contraflow

Between the Indian Ocean and the Red Sea, the stretch of water separating the Horn of Africa and the Arabian Peninsula represents a microcosm of today's worldwide flows of human traffic. No other place on earth has witnessed more cycles of conflict, forcing so many people into successive rotations in such a small space.

Contraflows of migrants and refugees move through a labyrinth of ever more dangerous routes, exchanging insecurities, jumping between continents, from one battlefield to another. Criss-crossing Ethiopia, Somalia, Djibouti, Yemen and Saudi Arabia, journeys across the Gulf of Aden have become increasingly chaotic. Under spells cast by a near mythological smuggler, a generation of young men and women seeking to escape conflict, poverty and climate change, has been seduced by promises of better futures elsewhere. Promises that have, in

turn, fuelled a new wholesale model of people trafficking. Known as tahriib, the travellers are drawn into a realm in which there is often complete disregard for life. A deadly human shuffle in which the odds are never favourable.

Journeying into this dangerous, clandestine world, "Yemen Contraflow" follows the inadvertent search for a allegorical people smuggler, who may or may not exist. Weaving together intimate photographs and texts, the work evokes how the fate and the personal stories of the thariib are symptomatic of both dreams and

interminable conflicts. Reframing traditional refugee narratives, it sets out to challenge where fears of migration really stem from.



"Put your soul on your hand and walk' is my response as a filmmaker to the ongoing massacres of Palestinians. A miracle happened when I met Fatma Hassona. She became my eyes in Gaza, where she resisted by documenting the war, and I became a link between her and the rest of the world, from her 'Gaza prison' as she called it. We maintained this lifeline for almost a year. The bits of pixels and sounds we exchanged became the film you see. Fatma's assassination on 16 April 2025 following an Israeli attack on her home changed its meaning forever."

Algorithms have never posed such a powerful threat to information. Journalism must now fight against a hybrid, permanent and powerful enemy: disinformation and misinformation. Can we still get information from social media? How can we trust it, how can we know, how can we fight back? Information, especially that coming from the field and from reporting, must now face enemy armies, those of 'fake news' used for commercial or military purposes. Since the beginning of Russia's invasion of Ukraine, the Kremlin has been making extensive use of Al tools



to push its 'narrative.' In the US election campaign, X, formerly Twitter, played a huge role, directly controlled by Elon Musk to help Donald Trump get re-elected. We can distinguish three types of threats, which we will return to later:

- > disinformation or misinformation, which have always existed
- > algorithms, which spread and amplify them, sometimes deliberately for propaganda purposes, but also for commercial reasons or simply mechanically, and which contribute to creating bubbles and silos
- > generative AI, which makes it possible to fabricate disinformation on an unprecedented scale and at unprecedented speed, but also to blur

the distinction between truth and falsehood (to the point of polluting itself)

To try to gain a clearer understanding, but also to learn more about the tools and threats, we are hosting an evening of discussion with Elsa Guiol, documentary filmmaker and editor-in-chief of the series 'La fabrique du mensonge' (The Lie Factory), David Colon, historian and professor at Sciences Po, specialist in propaganda, and Adrien Jaulmes, senior reporter and correspondent for *Le Figaro* in the United States. The evening will be moderated by Lucas Menget.

Inside Gaza invites us to reflect on the necessity of journalism on the ground amid growing attacks on media freedom.

The war ravaging the Gaza Strip has placed AFP journalists in a complex situation: trapped in an area where the rest of the international press has been denied free access, they themselves have become a target. Many images have reached us from Gaza since the start of the war, but the conditions in which they were taken are largely unknown. Drawing on hundreds of hours of rushes, photos and articles they produced during their confinement in Gaza, Mai Yaghi, Adel El-Zaanoun, Mohammed Abed and Mahmud Hams recount their disbelief at the escalation, the omnipresence of death and injury, the flight, the survival, the feeling of powerlessness.



This is the story of a once protected and respected profession that is now under attack from propaganda and fake news from all sides, calling into question the very essence of war journalism.

Iran: 12 days of war, but 46 years of conflict

Operations Rising Lion, Honest Promise 3, and Midnight Hammer characterised what historians are already calling The Twelve-Day War (13-24 June 2025) between Israel, the United States, and Iran. This lightning war, which killed more than a thousand civilians, was scrutinised hour by hour by the international press. It seemed as if the conflict would engulf the entire world. But then it ended as suddenly as it had begun, without however silencing the fears and anxieties surrounding Iran. This climate of tension began in 1979 when the Islamic Revolution brought Ayatollah Khomeini to power in Iran: hostile to Israel, close to the Lebanese Hezbollah, a

pivotal country for stability in the Middle East (war against Iraq, involvement in Yemen and Syria) and deeply hostile to the United States. On the American side, diplomacy with Tehran is modelled on the White House's casting choices. With Donald Trump, it is the message of firmness that prevails.

Domestically, the regime has no intention of implementing any economic reforms despite the severe embargo imposed on the country, let alone touching societal laws such as those making the wearing of the veil compulsory, and it represses any dissent with bloodshed. Successive demonstrations have failed to overthrow the regime, and the Revolutionary Guards have not managed to stifle these movements.

Trains and War

A film by Emmanuel Carrère and Lucas Menget

The Ukrainian railway is the sixth largest passenger network in the world. Trains have been running non-stop since 24 February 2022, managing to transport Ukrainians to safety. Only one passenger station has been attacked since the beginning. Behind the windows of the trains crossing Ukraine, war rages.

On board these trains, every passenger is also carrying the war, fear, doubts and unwavering determination. We boarded these trains with them, filmed and listened to the passengers:



their names are Artiom, Olga, Lena, Sammy, Edik, Alyona and Andriy, whose nom de guerre is 'Pitbull'. We met families fleeing the combat zones with little more than the clothes on their backs, wives returning to spend a day with their husbands who have become soldiers, men joining the front lines or returning wounded in body and soul.

All of them tell their stories of war, their hopes, those who still believe in peace and those who no longer do...

The Ghosts of Ukraine

A documentary by Anne Poiret, produced by SQUAWK & AFTER WAR, FRANCE TÉLÉVISIONS

The missing are a blind spot in the war in Ukraine, a pain that has gone unnoticed by the media. These civilians captured by Russia in the occupied territories and soldiers swallowed up in the hell of combat haunt Ukrainian society behind the front lines, while tens of thousands of women search for a partner, a son or a sister.

For two years, this documentary followed the struggle of three of these women. Ludmilla and

Ludeshka's husbands disappeared on the front lines in 2023, while Tetyana's husband, a simple farmer from the Kherson region, was kidnapped during the first months of the occupation. Where are they? Torn between the hope of finding them and the anguish of impossible mourning, they besiege government offices, morgues and NGOs, scrolling the



internet in search of information, and wait anxiously for each new prisoner exchange that could bring their men back.

With their numbers exploding – **73,000 in the spring of 2025** – Ukraine has decided not to wait for the end of the war to locate them, bring back its prisoners, and exchange the dead with the enemy. But for all these women, how can they continue to live among all these ghosts?

Afghanistan: Women's Impossible Journey

A film by Marine Courtade and Mortaza Behboudi Arte Reportage, production Kraken Films

Since the Taliban returned to power in 2021, women have seen their freedoms steadily eroded. They are effectively imprisoned, to the point where their only desire is to leave the country or, in some cases, to commit suicide.

But even when their dream of exile is strong, the journey to another country seems impossible.



Western embassies are closed in Kabul, women must be accompanied by a male family member to travel within the country, they need enough money to settle elsewhere and wait for visas that take months to arrive, and universities impose conditions that are not always clear. These women's hopes are often dashed. And their living conditions Afghanistan remain appalling. This report by Marine Courtade and Mortaza Behboudi was filmed in France and Afghanistan, among the very few who have succeeded and those who

cling to the idea of leaving. Today, it is very difficult to obtain a press visa, as the Taliban distribute them sparingly. Marine Courtade therefore travelled there on a tourist visa and filmed every image clandestinely, using a mobile phone. This is how she was able to meet Marwa, Shakiba and Hanifa and follow them as they try to take steps to keep their hopes alive.

On Thursday 9 October, Reporters Without Borders (RSF) will pay solemn tribute to journalists killed in the line of duty over the past year. At a ceremony at the Reporters' Memorial, RSF's Executive Director, Thibaut Bruttin, will unveil a plaque engraved in their memory, in the presence of their relatives. This year, 73 names have been engraved on the white marble. The severity of the toll is due in particular to the number of Palestinian journalists killed in Gaza by the Israeli army. RSF will pay tribute to them at the foot of the olive tree planted last year at the entrance to the memorial.

Kazakh journalist Nataliia Sadykova will also be present to talk about her fight for information alongside her husband, **Aydos Sadykov**, who was shot dead in the street on 18 June 2024 in

Kyiv, the Ukrainian capital. Mauricio Cruz Solís, director of the digital media outlet Minuto x Minuto, was brutally shot dead in the centre of the municipality of Uruapan, in the state of Michoacán, western Mexico, on 29 October 2024. He was only 25 years old. His mother, Maria Guillermina Solís, and his sister, Rebeca Cruz Solís, will be present to pay tribute to him. A few months later, on 4 December 2024, an air strike on the town of Morek killed photojournalist Anas Alkharboutli. This media professional, who was

awarded the Bayeux Award for War Correspondents in the Young Reporter category in 2020, was covering clashes between opposition groups and the Syrian army in central Syria. His brother, **Mohammad Kamal Alkharboutli**, will attend to honour his memory.






